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DIRECTORS' REPORT

Results and review of operations

The operating loss after income tax of the consolidated entity for the half-year was \$373,782 (2021: loss \$360,544).

The reported losses reflect the nature of the consolidated entity's principal activity, being mineral exploration.

During the half year period the principal activity of the Group was exploration for gold, copper-gold and nickel-copper-PGE deposits in northern Queensland, Australia. There were no significant changes in the nature of the company's activities during the reporting period.


Matters subsequent to reporting date



NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

Note 1 General Information

Superior Resources Limited (the **Company**) is a company limited by shares, incorporated and domiciled in Australia. The Company's shares are listed on the Australian Securities Exchange.

The financial statements are for the Group consisting of Superior Resources Limited and its subsidiaries (the **consolidated entity** or the **Group**).

There have been no significant changes in the nature of the principal activities of the Group during the half year.

Note 2 Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Statement of compliance

The half-year financial report is a general purpose financial report prepared in accordance with the *Corporations Act 2001* and AASB 134 'Interim Financial Reporting'. Compliance with AASB 134 ensures compliance with International Financial Reporting Standard IAS 34 'Interim Financial Reporting'. The Group is a for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing this report.

This half-year financial report does not include all the notes of the type normally included in an Annual Financial Report and therefore cannot be expected to provide as full an understanding of the financial position and financial performance of the Group as the Annual Financial Report. As a result, this report should be read in conjunction with the 30 June 2022 Annual Financial Report of the Group and any public announcements made in the period by the Group in accordance with the continuous disclosure requirements of the Corporations Act 2001 and the ASX Listing Rules.

The financial statements were approved and authorised for issue by the Directors on 13 March 2023.

(b) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and under the historical cost convention, as modified where applicable by the revaluation of financial assets and liabilities at fair value through other comprehensive income.

The accounting policies and methods of computation adopted in the preparation of the half-year financial statements are consistent with those of the previous financial year and corresponding interim reporting period.

NOTES TO THE CONSOLIDATED FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE HALF-YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2022

Note 3 Application of New and Revised Accounting Standards

The consolidated entity has adopted all the new, revised or amending Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period. There has been no material impact on the financial statements by their adoption and therefore no material changes to the Company's accounting policies are necessary.

Any new, revised or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been adopted. The potential financial impact of these changes is not yet possible to determine.

Note 4 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

Estimates and judgements are continually evaluated and are based on historical experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that may have a financial impact on the entity and that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

Critical judgements in applying the entity's accounting policies

The Group has capitalised exploration expenditure of \$11,284,512 (30 June 2022: \$8,888,186). These amounts include costs directly associated with exploration. These costs are capitalised as an intangible asset until assessment of the permit is complete and the results have been evaluated. These costs include employee remuneration, materials, rig costs, delay rentals and payments to contractors. The expenditure is carried forward until such a time as the asset moves into the development phase, is abandoned or sold. Given exploration activities have not yet reached a stage which permits a reasonable assessment of the existence or otherwise of recoverable resources and the difficulty in forecasting cash flows to assess the fair value of exploration expenditure there is uncertainty as to the carrying value of exploration expenditure is dependent upon the successful development and commercial exploitation or, alternatively, sale of the interest in the tenements.

Note 5 Going Concern

Notwithstanding that the Group incurred an operating loss after tax of \$373,782 (2021: loss of \$360,544) and had net cash outflows from operating activities of \$502,314 (2021: outflow of \$487,853), these financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes continuity of normal business activities and the realisation of assets and the settlement of liabilities in the ordinary course of business.

The ability of the consolidated entity to continue as a going concern is dependent upon one or more of the following:

- achieving sufficient future cash flows from operations to enable its obligations to be met;
- the success of cost saving initiatives, which include entering into Joint Venture arrangements and reducing tenement areas, so as to reduce the carrying and expenditure costs for tenements;
- cash flows from the sale of any of the Group's assets; and/or
- obtaining additional funding from capital raising activities.

The Directors acknowledge that to continue the exploration and development of the Group's exploration projects, the budgeted cash flows from operating and investing activities for the future will necessitate further capital raisings.

The Directors are confident of being able to secure additional funding and believe the entity is a going concern and will be able to pay its debts as and when they fall due and payable.

At the date of this report and having considered the above factors, the Directors are confident that the Group will be able to continue as a going concern.

Note 5 Going Concern (continued)

The reliance on future funding requirements indicates that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the Group's ability to continue as a going concern with the result that the Group may be required to realise its assets at amounts different from those currently recognised, settle liabilities other than in the ordinary course of business and make provisions for costs which may arise as a result of cessation or curtailment of normal business operations. The interim financial report does not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts or the amounts or classification of liabilities that may result from the outcome of this uncertainty.

Note 6 Segment Information

The Group operates solely within one segment, being the mineral exploration industry in Australia.

Conclusion

Material Uncertainty Related to Going Concern


We draw attention to Note 5 in the financial report, which indicates that the consolidated group incurred a net loss after tax of \$373,782 during the half year ended 31 December 2022 and had net cash outflows from operating activities of \$502,314. These events or conditions, along with other matters as set forth in Note 5, indicate that a material uncertainty exists that may cast significant doubt on the consolidated group's ability to continue as a going concern. Our conclusion is not modified in respect of this matter.
